The impact of the ITG project on employability and the professional future of a new generation.

One of the greatest challenges facing young people in Eastern Europe is the transition from learning to employment. Having an education no longer guarantees job opportunities, especially in contexts where the market is limited or undergoing constant transformation.

The ITG – InTechGrowth project was created precisely to narrow this gap, providing young people not only with knowledge, but with practical tools aimed at enhancing their employability and encouraging self-employment.

Through the digital incubator, educational materials, and training activities, participants have developed key competencies highly valued in today's job market: critical thinking, entrepreneurial initiative, digital skills, and adaptability.



However, the impact goes beyond acquiring skills. The project has helped shift the mindset of these young people, empowering them to transition from job seekers to opportunity creators.

In many cases, this translates into launching their own business projects. In others, it means better preparation to access skilled jobs or pursue further education with a stronger foundation.

Furthermore, open access to the project's resources ensures that this impact is not limited to direct participants, allowing it to reach other young people and multiply its scope.
